How did students perform on the pre-assessment?</i></p> <p>Data from 2012-2013 NYSESLAT results (if available) and the LAB-R results (if available), in conjunction with relevant academic historical data, will be used as baseline data for setting individualized targets for ELL students. <b>Target(s)</b>	<p><i>What is the expected outcome (target) of students' level of knowledge of the learning content at the end of the instructional period?</i></p> <p>80% of students will meet their individualized growth targets. These individualized targets will be set using the various performance levels associated with the NYSESLAT (i.e., Beginning, Intermediate, Advanced, Proficient).</p>

<b>Rationale</b>	<p><i>What are the reasons for choosing this learning content, evidence and target?</i></p>
	<p>All students included in this SLO are enrolled in 9-12<sup>th</sup> grade classrooms. This group of students were identified as students with limited English proficiency. While some of the students included in this SLO have 2012-13 NYSESLAT results, others were given the LAB-R when they entered the school.</p>
	<p>The results from these assessments, in conjunction with other relevant academic performance data available for each student will be used to set individualized targets on the 2014 NYSESLAT, using the possible performance levels of beginning, intermediate, advanced, or proficient. Using multiple sources of data will allow me to tailor the instructional program and academic goals for each student based on their starting level of performance and individual needs.</p>
	<p>New York State's Education Law 3204 and the federal NCLB Act, require that all English language learners from kindergarten through grade 12 be assessed with NYSESLAT every year to measure their English language proficiency in listening, speaking, reading, and writing and track their annual progress toward proficiency. The NYSESLAT, used as the summative assessment, will determine students' proficiency levels at the end of grades 9-12. Students meeting their individualized targets should also become more successful with grade-level content as listed in the Learning Content component above. This summative assessment measures the New York State Learning Standards for English as a Second Language (2004), and is also a stepping stone toward measurement of the Common Core Learning Standards. This assessment will be administered during April/May 2014</p> <p>NYSESLAT helps schools determine which instructional standards they must focus on to ensure their English language learners fully acquire the language proficiency that will prepare them for success in the classroom. The use of multiple data sources in target setting allows for rigorous and attainable goals to be set for each student. The inclusion of listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills will ensure that students are receiving a comprehensive instructional program as they work to gain proficiency with the English language. Progress will be monitored throughout the course of the year and adjustments to instructional strategies will be made as necessary to continuously move students toward proficiency in all four modalities.</p>
